



We must say that 2024 has been quite a ride! As many of you know, our founder and instructor/program director retired last year. Due to a significant shortage of qualified PATH-certified instructors, we could not find someone with her level of expertise and values that fit our barn's culture.

We were worried we would not be able to open in 2024, but we reached out to an instructor who had been involved in Reinbow several years ago. She gave us 8 weeks of her time this spring and summer so that we could continue our mission of providing therapeutic horsemanship programming to members of our community who are experiencing social emotional, physical, and or developmental challenges. During this "abbreviated season," we fulfilled our 2023-2024 grant obligations by serving our local school populations as promised. We maintained a



presence in the community and gathered many new participants. Our dedicated base of volunteers was, as always, crucial in supporting our riders/participants through their journeys.

We have also been busy grant writing and have been awarded grants from all of the previous organizations and businesses who have supported us such as United Way, the Mergens Foundation, Magris Talc Co., The Windham Foundation as well as several others. This summer, we were awarded financial support from several new sources such as Ben & Jerrys, M&T Charitable Funds and Velco.





#### The Cradle, The Cross and the Crown

In the summer of 1984, on a backpacking tour of Europe, Laura and I wandered through the majestic splendor of London's masterpiece, Westminster Abbey. It has a rich historical background. In the tenth century, Benedictine monks began a tradition of daily worship there that still continues today. The Abbey is also the final resting place of 3,500 individuals including Sir Issac Newton, Charles Dickens and George Frederic Handel.

Sixteen royal weddings have taken place beneath its intricate fan-vaulted ceiling, largest in the UK. This spectacular structure has witnessed the coronation of every English monarch since that of William the Conqueror on Christmas day in AD 1066, including the crowning of Queen Elizabeth

II on the 2nd of June, 1953. In fact, sixteen of those monarchs are also *buried* theretheir rule ending where it began.

No matter how grandiose their burial, world leaders rise and fall; they live and die. But another king was *born* to die. The shadow of a cross falls over the lovely manger scene of Christmas.

In His first coming, King Jesus was crowned with thorns and nailed to a Roman crossbean, crucified as the "King of the Jews". Unlike worldly monarchs, he, though once dead, is no longer buried. That's why Christmas and Easter are inseparable. One *has* to follow the other. Because Jesus rose from the dead in victory, we who are Christ followers have hope *beyond* the grave and the assurance that we will live with Him forever. Jesus clearly stated, "I have come that you might have life in all its fullness *now*...I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will *never* die."

#### Change is in the air...

Like the temperature changes outside that will soon bring us winter, Election Day results will bring a different dynamic to the State House in January.

The current supermajority in the Vermont legislature has been dissolved. The Democrats will maintain majorities in the House and Senate but will no longer be able to override vetoes by the Governor without Republican help. Republicans picked up 18 or 19 seats in the House (depending on how you classify a former Republican member who became a Libertarian) and 6 in the Senate.

Additionally, it is likely there will be a recount in the Springfield House district and a possible revote in a Bennington County district that apparently sent about 40 residents in Pownal the wrong ballot.

The change in makeup will mean that compromise will be necessary for any major legislation to pass. The Democratic majority will continue to drive the legislative agenda but will need to find common ground with Republicans and Governor Scott to enact new bills.

Former Democratic legislator and now Republican, John Rogers, defeated the incumbent Lt Governor, David Zuckerman, a Progressive/Democrat from Chittenden County. While this race will ultimately be decided by the legislature as neither candidate received 50% of the vote, it's unlikely the legislature will vote to change the outcome.

Controversial measures, such as the Clean Heat initiative, face an uncertain future. The law, which was enacted last year by overriding a gubernatorial veto, would have increased the cost of heating fuels to fund other energy measures. It is slated to return to the legislature in January for another approval, which is now less likely. The original sponsor of the measure, Senator Chris Bray, D-Addison, was one of the lawmakers to lose re-election last week.

Education finance changes are also on the table, given the pushback from voters on increased property taxes. The legislation, which passed last session via a veto override, set up a two-year commission to come back and recommend changes. Many lawmakers do not believe we can wait two years, and that action needs to be taken sooner rather than later.

Other laws enacted over vetoes could be revisited, but that would take the legislative majority to reconsider their past votes and might be too high a hurdle.

While Governor Scott successfully campaigned hard for candidates to achieve more balance at the State House, he urged newly elected and re-elected lawmakers to put aside the "D" or "R" after your name and work for your communities, not your party. He further said, "...at the end of the day, we're all on Team Vermont."



**2. Discuss Susco Bankruptcy Case.** Mr. Turco noted that he had discussed with the town attorney the Susco case and the Reservation of Rights documents

provided by PACIF (the Town's insurer) regarding their representation of the Town in the Susco bankruptcy case. Merrill Bent, Town Attorney, called in to the meeting to offer guidance regarding PACIF's documents requiring signature. Ms. Bent noted that she will remain involved at a minimal cost to the Town, for any services not covered by PACIF, but confirmed that PACIF had assigned the case

b. Treasurer's Report - Elizabeth Karle. Ms. Karle noted that the Town has been receiving 75% federal cost share for projects from the July 2023 flood reimbursement, but going forward will receive an additional 15% from federal sources. Going forward the Town will only be responsible for 2.2% of projects' costs after the State of Vermont pays the ERAF portion (after completion of all projects). She added that the Town is in its strongest cash position of the year due to the bulk of owed property tax payments being collected. Interest income also took a big jump this month. Thus far this fiscal year, \$365,000 has been received in FEMA funds. In addition, the Town's first income from recycling metal was collected from Casella; the \$450 in income offset monthly fees.



- **i. Final MHVRS Account Settlement.** Ms. Karle reported that the former Rescue Squad brought in a final settlement of \$15,459.94. This was a final closure of their accounts and they presented a balance sheet and final income statement. No further assets are expected.
- c. Fire Department Update Bill Austin. Tabled.
- **d. Planning Commission Update:** Jeff Chase made a motion to appoint Andrew Seward and Jim Seward to additional three-year terms on the Planning Commission.

#### 6. New Business

- a. Winter Road Salt Quotes. The Select Board voted last month to purchase salt from Apalachia; that purchase has been completed. Additional quotes from Cargill and Eastern have been filed.
- **b. FY23 Grants-In-Aid Reporting Deadline.** Clinton Woolley and Elizabeth Karle are collaborating to file the report for the funded work, completed in August.

Mr. Turco made a motion to purchase the additional kits for the other vehicles; Ms. Garrow seconded; unanimously approved.
- **e. Dog License Fees.** Ms. Garrow-Woolley noted that the State is raising their fees for dog licenses from \$5 to \$7; she asked the Select Board to consider whether they

wanted to raise the Town's fees in tandem. Current fees are \$11 for neutered/spayed by April 1; unneutered is \$15 by April 1. The Select Board deliberated and elected not to make a change.

f. Renew FWS Permit. Mr. Turco made a motion to renew the permit for geese depredation at Star Lake; Diana Garrow seconded; unanimously approved. Mr. Unterman noted that the program was at its most successful this year. The clerk will file the annual report and apply for a renewal.

#### 7. Ongoing & Old Business

- a. Beaver Issues on 1668 Hortonville Road. Mr. McGough of 1668 Hortonville Road noted that due to beaver activity, his shed and deck are compromised; the stream water level is rising and infringing on both buildings. Mr. Turco recommended Mr. McGough be in touch with the regional game warden regarding remediation.
- b. Re-sign NEMRC Contract. The Board Chair re-signed the contract, which was misplaced after the last meeting.
- c. Revisit FY24 Municipal Planning Grant. Jeff Chase noted he, Jon McCann, Elizabeth Karle and Faith Tempest had considered responses to the Town's RFP for a housing study to be funded by the FY24 Municipal Planning Grant. There were five responses; Mr. Chase noted that SEG offered the best proposal. SEG's bid is within the grant amount (\$33,333K - \$29,999K from State with a \$3,336K Town match). Mr. Chase made a motion to select SEG to conduct the study; Ms. Garrow seconded; unanimously approved.
- d. Conservation Commission Appointments. Ms. Garrow made a motion to appoint Alexandra Yuster to the Conservation Commission; Mark Turco seconded; unanimously approved.
- e. Health Insurance Plan Selection. Ms. Karle noted that Blue Cross Blue Shield VT rates are projected to rise between 13-15% next year, which would put the Town over budget for health insurance costs.. She has compared the Town's current BCBSVT Platinum plan to comparable MVP plans, to consider whether a change in provider could offer cost reductions to the Town without significantly impacting coverage or out-of-pocket costs for employees. She shared research and scenarios with the Select Board to inform a decision, noting that MVP offers an integrated Health Reimbursement Account (HRA) that can be paired with an insurance plan to keep employees' out-of-pocket comparable to the current plan while saving the Town \$17,000 per year. Jeff Chase made a motion for the Town to select the MVP VT GOld 3 QHDHP Plan as the health insurance plan offered to Town employees; Mark Turco seconded; unanimously approved. Mr. Turco also made a motion for the Town to adopt an HRA at the level of \$2,000 per individual/year and \$4,000 per family plan/year; Ms. Garrow seconded; unanimously approved.
- f. Reappoint Rutland REMC Voting Members. Mr. Turco made a motion to reappoint Jeff Chase as emergency management representative and Billy Austin as emergency services representative for the Rutland Regional Emergency Management Committee.
- g. New Highway Employee. The Select Board reviewed applications for the open position on the highway crew and interviewed the



qualified candidate that had expressed interest in the position. Mr. Turco noted that the candidate had a Class A CDL, was formerly the Mount Holly School bus driver, and had done some part-time seasonal work for the Town in the past. Mr. Turco made a motion to hire Dennis Cointreau as the new highway employee; Mr. Chase seconded; unanimously approved.

- In collaboration with the Mount Holly Conservation Trust, we are making an inventory of the vegetation and wild life in and around the Lake. This is nearly completed and will very helpful in applying for permissions and grants to make the lake area friendlier to recreation.
- We hosted a presentation from the State of Vermont Wetland supervisor for Rutland county on opportunities and procedures to improve the recreational situation
- We are in the process of developing a comprehensive plan to move forward in the coming years. Completely restoring the past is not likely, but substantial improvement is. As we develop a plan, we intend to share drafts and look forward to receiving comments.

#### Ash Borer Mitigation Project.

- We continued for the second year our programs to aid landowners to protect their Ash trees.
- In 2024, Mount Holly Landowners performed 824 injections in their Ash trees and reimbursed the town for the cost of the chemicals
- This program will continue in 2025. We now have about seventy injectors so we can lend out injectors to 4-5 people simultaneously from late May to mid-July.
- Aside the cost of the injectors this program is basically zero cost to the town.

#### **Energy Fair**

- In June of 2024, we organized an Energy Fair in the Community Center where several government and private entities presented and described their offerings to help conserve energy, to reduce fossil fuel consumption and to decrease residential waste production.
- As part of the grant for the Energy Fair, we have used some of the funds to perform energy audits of four public buildings in Mount Holly, There are: Town Office, Odd Fellows Hall, Perkins house of the Historical

### Museum, and the Town Library building. **Recreation Committee.**

- We have formed a recreation committee as a sub-committee of the Conservation Commission.
- · The Committee is open to all who are interested in advancing, utilizing, or publicizing recreational opportunities in and around Mount Holly.
- · This group will meet on the third Tuesday of each month and will announce its meetings in the Mount Holly Newsflash.
- The group is initially focusing on trails for hiking, snowshoeing and cross country skiing and on Star Lake including additions and improvements in the swimming area.

#### **Bio-Diversity project**

- The Mount Holly Biodiversity Project is developing a comprehensive baseline inventory of the plants, animals, and fungi found in Mount Holly.
- This program is being continued by Jim Corven who should be contacted regarding progress and participation. By Pilippe Crane






#### Ludlow Rotary Hears Bike Trail Update And about TRSU Long Term Forecast

At its recent meetings, the Ludlow Rotary Club (LRC) heard from two interesting speakers.



Recently, Charlie Rimer, Ludlow Area Sport Trails (LAST) updated the club about the considerable progress made on the construction of the first 3.5 mile multi-use trail on the "Back 40" behind the Ludlow Elementary School. The trail opened on June 15 to the public for biking, walking, snow shoeing, and cross country skiing. Bikes may be mountain or road bikes, and regular or ebikes. The trail was constructed professionally with funds provided by the Town of Ludlow using AARPA money. The fact that the trail did not get damaged during the summer flood demonstrates the importance of having the trail

built professionally. The long term vision of the group is a well-marked path from Jackson Gore to Cavendish that is off road, accessible to all and well used.

Those who wish to explore the trail loops should park at the Okemo Valley TV station, go around the baseball fields and follow the signs past the community gardens.

Most recently, Layne Millington, Superintendent of Two Rivers Supervisory Union (TRSU), spoke to the group about falling and disparate school enrollments among the elementary schools, short term capital improvements needed in the schools, and longer term funding options. His long term predictions of the need for additional school consolidations generated a lively discussion with the Rotary Club. Millington stated the lack of local control over local school taxes would force the issue within the next 5 to 10 years. Vermont ratios of students to teachers is much lower than nationwide averages, which is part of the reason education is so costly in Vermont, he stated. Rotarians suggested alternatives to be considered. Millington stated there will be opportunities for many more discussions and much more planning before any actions are taken.

was the night before Christmas, he lived all alone, in a one bedroom house made of plaster and stone. I had come down the chimney with presents to give, and to see just who in this home did live. I looked all about, a strange sight I did see, no tinsel, no presents, not even a tree.

No stocking by mantle, just boots filled with sand, and on the wall pictures of far distant lands. With medals and badges, awards of all kinds, a sobering thought came to my mind. For this house was different, so dark and so dreary, the home of a soldier, now I could see clearly.

The soldier lay sleeping, silent, alone, curled up on the floor in this one bedroom home. The face was so gentle, the room in such disorder, not how I pictured a United States soldier. Was this the hero of whom I'd just read? Curled up on a poncho, the floor for a bed?

I realized the families that I saw this night, owed their lives to these soldiers who were willing to fight. Soon round the world, the children would play, and grownups would celebrate a bright Christmas day. They all enjoyed freedom each month of the year, because of the soldiers, like the one lying here.

I couldn't help wonder how many lay alone, on a cold Christmas eve in a land far from home. The very thought brought a tear to my eye, I dropped to my knees and started to cry. The soldier awakened and I heard a rough voice, "Santa don't cry, this life is my choice;

I fight for freedom, I don't ask for more, my life is my God, my country, my corps."
The soldier rolled over and soon drifted to sleep, I couldn't control it, I continued to weep. I kept watch for hours, so silent and still, and we both shivered from the cold evening's chill.

I didn't want to leave on that cold, dark, night, this guardian of honor so willing to fight.

Then the soldier rolled over, with a voice soft and pure, whispered, "Carry on Santa, it's Christmas day, all is secure." One look at my watch, and I knew he was right. "Merry Christmas my friend, and to all a good night."



#### **Clement Clarke Moore Miniature Biography**

Clement Clarke Moore (1799 - 1863) came from a prominent family and his father Benjamin Moore was the Bishop of New York who was famous for officiating at the inauguration of George Washington. The tradition of reading Twas the night before Christmas poem on Christmas Eve is now a Worldwide institution and tradition.

Clement Clarke Moore (1779 - 1863) wrote the poem Twas the night before Christmas also called "A Visit from St. Nicholas" in 1822. It is now the tradition in many American families to read the poem every Christmas Eve. The poem 'Twas the night before



Christmas' has redefined our image of Christmas and Santa Claus. Prior to the creation of the story of 'Twas the night before Christmas' St. Nicholas, the patron saint of children, had never been associated with a sleigh or reindeers!

Clement Moore, the author of the poem Twas the night before Christmas, was a reticent man and it is believed that a family friend, Miss H. Butler, sent a copy of the poem to the New York Sentinel who published the poem. The condition of publication was that the author of Twas the night before Christmas was to remain anonymous.

The first publication date was 23rd December 1823 and it was an immediate success. It was not until 1844 that Clement Clarke Moore claimed ownership when the work was included in a book of his poetry.
